Speech & language therapist including ongoing Welcomm support	Training can support adults to ensure they model and develop children's oral language skills and vocabulary development.	2,4
	Makaton can support children with communication difficulties, by giving them a way to express themselves independently. Being able to communicate eases	

	frustration and gives children confidence and independence while they develop communication and language skills. Intensive Interaction can support children to feel connected, like you're speaking their language and sharing their thoughts and ideas, in a way that they can understand. It can also help children to feel more aware of themselves, their bodies, the people around them and their environment.	
Talking time	This initiative aims to support education recovery following the pandemic whilst also developing an understanding of effective professional development in the Early Years. Nurture	The development of self-regulation and executive function is consistently linked with successful learning, including pre-reading skills, early mathematics and problem solving. Strategies that seek to improve learning by increasing self-regulation have an average impact of five additional months' progress. A number of studies suggest that	1,2,3

	improving the self-regulation skills of children in the early years is likely to have a lasting positive impact on later learning at school, and also have a positive impact on wider outcomes such as behaviour and persistence.	
Number bags	An EEF study highlights that parental engagement strategies including using practical resources at home can contribute to children's progress.	1, 2
Sensory bags	Studies frequently highlight the positive impact of sensory toys in enhancing various aspects of child development, from cognitive skills to emotional regulation and inclusive play opportunities. Sensory toys, particularly those with tactile elements like squishy toys or stress balls, have demonstrated calming effects. They can aid in emotional regulation and self-soothing for children experiencing anxiety or stress.	1,4
Colour monster story & resources	Research shows that associating emotions with colours can help children better understand their feelings. The colour monster, in particular, provides children with an accessible to identify emotions.	1,2,3,4
Well-being bags	Supporting families helps to bring a calmer approach to their home life. Stronger relationships between parents and practitioners are consistently associated for better outcomes for children.	1, 3
