The children have embraced the rainy days with jumping in bubbly puddles with huge enjoyment.




We've spent this week creating Easter crafts to take home and share with their families. The children have really enjoyed these activities and shown creativity, using a range of resources and imagination.

Awareness Week

To celebrate awareness week, I invited some parents to share stories of their children. I'm sure you will agree with me, how beautiful they are.

Hi! My name is Kurtis, I'm autistic with pre verbal communication. Some might assume that because I'm unable to talk to you that I don't have anything to say and that couldn't be more wrong. You might think that I'm unable to learn things or that I'm in my own world - again, not true at all! I can say the alphabet in English and Spanish ...apparently that's quite impressive?

My brother is also autistic and he has language, because of this people might assume that he experiences 'milder autism' but I know he struggles with other things that I find a breeze (I can unwrap a kinder chocolate bar by myself, not to brag!).

Sometimes I won't look at you when you are talking, or if you're like my brother you might not respond straight away to a question - I promise you we are both listening and just processing in a different way, so please allow some time for us to do this.

Sensory overload is a huge part of an autistic persons world and can be the difference between being able to function or not. I like to lay on the floor to feel grounded, and this doesn't matter where I am! If you're in the middle of your Tesco shop and I'm trying to ground, don't mind me!

I guess to sum up on this neurodiversity awareness week, my request to you would be to 'always assume competence'. Our brains might be different and our learning may look different to yours but if we're given the tools and the opportunities we can thrive as autistic people in this world!
